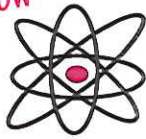


NIU STEMfest

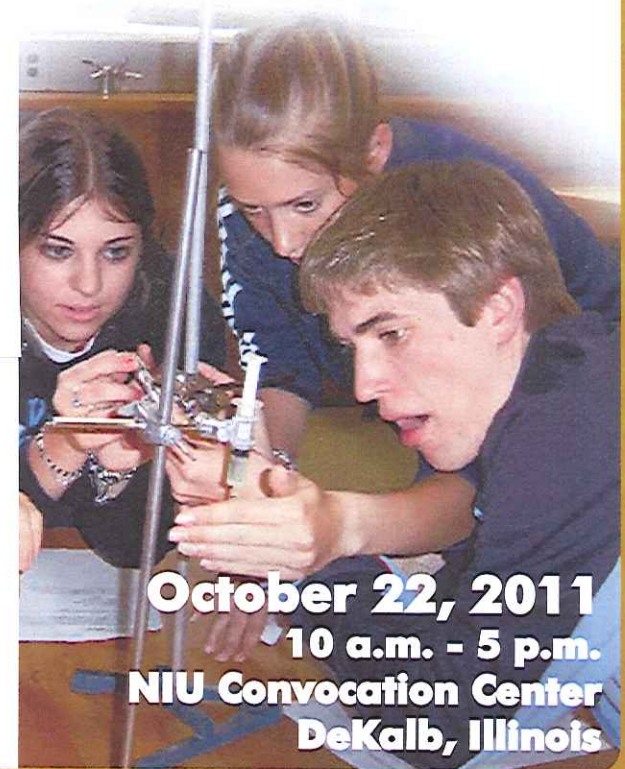
