### II. Peacock musical

For the second year personnel from the production company, Schaumburg on Stage will direct Peacock students in our annual musical play. This year, the company will produce *You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown*. Audition and rehearsal times have not been announced as of this writing but are anticipated to begin in late January or early February with information to be posted around the school as well as incorporated into our monthly calendar and newsletter publications.

### III. Community drug awareness forum

On Wednesday, January 19, 2005 at 7:00 pm the Itasca Police Department will host a community forum on drug awareness. The event will be open to the public and have as a focus local drug use and availability, paraphernalia used in connection with drug use, and signs and symptoms parents can look for to detect drug use by their children. This forum is the second in a series of community forums sponsored by the Itasca Police. The first was a gang awareness program held on September 30. Both topics were highly recommended by Peacock's Parent Advisory Committee as important parent resources.

#### **IV. Police assessing Peacock's safety procedures**

This past month members of the Itasca Police Department visited Peacock to discuss our school's emergency plan that included protective measures such as lock-downs, "shelter-in-place", and evacuations. While we as well as the other two schools have already provided the police with detailed floor plans, contact personnel with emergency phone numbers, and other critical information that would be needed in the event of an emergency, Peacock has not facilitated lock-down procedures without receiving more current input and recommendations from our law enforcement officials. A complete review of our physical plant has already been done by the police with a report of their recommendations expected by early January. The report will include among other items, the most effective lock-down procedures for our students and staff that takes into consideration our size, student traffic patterns, and the number of classrooms and student gathering locations we have. The report will also recommend options outside of Peacock which students and staff may be directed to during a lock-down in the event locations within Peacock are not available for their access (e.g. students at outdoor lunch recess, gym classes and other curricular programs conducting classes outside).
