II. Middle school science fair

Plans have begun for our annual science fair. This will be the first year that the fair will be exclusively a middle school event. Peacock students will continue to receive a comprehensive packet of information that details the requirements governing experiments and judging. Students will also continue to be eligible for the Golden Test Tube Award given to the highest ranked fair participants as determined by the judges. Awards will be given to the top performers at each of the three grade levels.

III. Peacock to honor graduates who served in our military

For the past four years Peacock has recognized former graduates who have earned significant success in their chosen profession by inducting them into our Wall of Fame. As I had briefly mentioned at the October board meeting, one of our teachers suggested that Peacock also include former graduates who have served or are serving in one of the branches of our military and include them in a display honoring their service and dedication to our country. A Distinguished Wall of Service display will soon grace the atrium of our school featuring pictures and brief bios of these men and women in uniform. We are currently soliciting the names of individuals who as graduates of Peacock since its inception in 1940 have given service to our country.

IV. After school tutorial program providing support for large numbers of Peacock students

Since the first days of September this year Peacock staff supervising our after school tutorial program have seen a significant increase in the number of students attending the program over the same time from previous years. Facilitated by four teachers, the tutoring takes place Monday through Wednesdays throughout the school year. To date, we have averaged nearly 20 students per day from all three grade levels availing themselves of math, Spanish, language arts, science, and social studies. This number is up from previous averages at this time of year that had ranged from a low of 5 to about 10-12 per day. Some of our students simply come to tutorial for an opportunity to complete homework or do research while most work with our available staff in specific curricular areas.
